What is the RISS Master Telephone Index (MTI)?

The RISS MTI is an investigative database designed to compare and match common telephone numbers in law enforcement investigations from across the nation. When call records containing telephone numbers are uploaded into or queried against the RISS MTI, matches from existing cases generate a hit report. RISS MTI contains millions of phone numbers from law enforcement cases uploaded by analysts and officers, phone numbers from the RISS Criminal Intelligence Database (RISSIntel), and extracted cell phone call history and contact information. RISS MTI also contains upload jail calls from various jail telephone services/vendors.

What are the features of RISS MTI?

RISS MTI generates hit reports for users whose cases match with telephone numbers within the database. The hit report includes the name and contact information of the submitting officer or analyst but does not include case details. RISS MTI also enables remote users to perform online queries of telephone numbers found during their investigations. RISS MTI contains these additional capabilities:

- RISS MTI Auto Uploader desktop application that enables users to send bulk extract telephone numbers and contact data. This custom desktop application performs data validation of the data and sends the information through the RISS Secure Cloud. A receipt of completion is sent to the submitting officer when data has been successfully uploaded.
- Automatic data query is performed on all incoming data or batches of data with a hit report disseminated to the user via email.
- Date range comparison tool to analyze the significance of hits in a specific time period.
- Upload of Cellebrite XML files supported.
- Analysis of data within a case.

Why should I use RISS MTI?

Sharing information with other law enforcement officers across jurisdictions enhances the ability of investigators to solve crimes committed in today's ever-changing criminal landscape. The information provided in the RISS MTI makes it possible to find links in communication between suspects that otherwise would not have been found.

Who can access RISS MTI?

The RISS MTI is available to approved RISS member law enforcement and criminal justice agencies.


